## **Contact Information**

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We at AFH are excited to embark on a new rescue mission. We were recently contacted by a rescue group in Puerto Rico. They were desperate for help with a huge dog overpopulation problem and were looking for an ethical, responsible, rescue group to partner with. After hearing their story, we had to say yes.

The founder of the rescue group is from Ohio but moved to Puerto Rico in 2012 for her husband's job. As she drove around the island she noticed the many dogs (known as Satos) wandering the streets. Sato is a Puerto Rican slang term referring to a mixed breed dog.

She quickly learned that Puerto Rico has a terrible stray dog problem. There are hundreds of thousands of satos on this tiny island that measures just 35 miles x 100 miles; estimates range from 100,000 to 500,000. These dogs are in sad conditions - starving and ill. Those that do not get claimed by an illness or hunger are in high danger of being hit by a car, only to die on the side of the road, alone and suffering. Still others are injured or killed by people.

All of these dogs have their own story and their own set of circumstances that led to their life on the street. Some were born to a stray mom and some were callously tossed onto the street by their families. Unfortunately, abandoning dogs on the street (normally under the cover of darkness) is very common. Once a family no longer wants a dog, they are taken to a location, booted out of the car, and left to fend for themselves. Some people will abandon them in an area where they know that someone stops to leave dog food and water, and some are abandoned in an area where there is no hope for survival.

Many are dumped at Dead Dog Beach in Yabucoa, a town in southeastern Puerto Rico. Dead Dog Beach is a dumping ground and dogs are dumped there every day. The actual name of Dead Dog Beach is Playa Lucia and it was once a popular vacation spot for beachgoers, having both a pool and cabanas. The pool is now filled in and the building lies in disrepair; it's covered in graffiti and surrounded by trash. No one visits any more and hundreds of dogs roam the beach in packs. It's not uncommon for a car to pull over, dump a dog, and speed off.

Most of the dogs are in poor shape, some are pregnant, and some are gravely ill. Some are very frightened or completely feral. Others have lived in homes and follow people around the beach, wagging their tails, and looking for their owners, food, or the touch of a human hand. Some dogs are in a state of shock and others have organized themselves into packs in their battle for survival.

None are spayed or neutered. It's a constant battle for food, and fights are common. The stronger ones survive, while older dogs, sick dogs, and puppies often don't survive – and that's where we come in.

Our partner in Puerto Rico takes in as many dogs and puppies as space allows. They are nursed back to health, spayed and neutered, and socialized, if necessary. Many of the dogs are friendly since they once had homes – homes that dumped them to fend for themselves.

As you can imagine, there are a lot of pregnant dogs and a lot of puppies being born. Unfortunately, there is nothing for them in Puerto Rico so their only chance to escape the suffering and danger is to be sent someplace where they will be loved.

### Dear Home,

There are many options for traveling with your dog – it really depends on your budget and your comfort level, so let's get started.

## Planes:

Traveling by plane is probably the quickest way to get your dog from point A to point B, but it also involves the most planning and research, not to mention money. There is no standard set of rules and regulations across the board, so be sure to check with your specific airline before purchasing your own tickets. Often times, small dogs are able to ride in the cabin with you, as long as they have their own ticket. Other times, your dog will have to ride in the cargo section of the aircraft. Bring Fido has a very helpful list of tips when bringing your dog with you on the plane, as well as a breakdown, by airline, of the different rules and requirements.

#### Trains:

Guess what! As of this year, certain small pets are allowed to travel with you by train. Of course, service animals have always been allowed, but now Amtrak is allowing small pets onboard, but only in certain locations. The transportation line is hoping to increase sales by allowing small cats and dogs to travel with their person. They will need to remain under the passenger's seat and will need to be generally well behaved – that means they need to be quiet, act in a safe manner, and need to be housebroken. ## And of course - Automobiles:

During the holiday season, this is the most widely used mode of transportation. It is usually the most cost effective method and allows the most flexibility. Having your furry friend on the road with you can be a wonderful adventure, but there are many things to keep in mind to make it the best possible experience. Some general pointers:

- For their safety, your dog(s) should always be restrained in the car. I know it's fun to hold them in your lap while you're driving, but this is not safe. What happens if you get into a little fender bender? Offering your dog a crate or a travel harness during the ride is ideal.
- Make frequent stops schedule in some time to get out and stretch and allow your dog to relieve him/herself every few hours. But remember to also keep meal times a little lighter and more spread out. It can be uncomfortable

for your dog to travel on a full stomach – particularly if they are prone to car sickness. If this is the case, you may want to ask your vet if it's a good idea to have some anti-nausea meds on hand in the event of a queasy pup. (This is also why traveling with a crate makes good sense)

- Speaking of stops make sure to secure your dog before opening the door when you do stop. Even if they are calm and low energy at home, being on the road can be a new experience for them and you never know when they may decide it's a good time to go exploring. Losing your beloved friend while on the road would be devastating. Don't take chances make sure they have their leash and collar on or are secure in a crate any time the car door is open.
- Long drives may involve an overnight stay in a hotel. Many lodging companies these days allow dogs – just be sure to check the fine print. Is there an extra fee? A deposit? Is your dog allowed to roam the room freely or are they expected to be crated while in the room? These are the things you will want to find out before booking a room. Although the list is constantly being updated, again – Bring Fido is a great resource for finding a hotel during your road trip.
- Remember to plan ahead and bring any toys, blankets, and treats with you. It will make them feel more at home. Also remember to pack more pet food than you think you will need, just in case of delays or bad weather.

As Chloe's "Dad", I have to admit the first time I saw her on the A Forever Home Rescue Foundation's website, my first reaction was that I didn't want a girly dog. However, the instant I met her, I told my wife that Chloe was going to be our dog! She was so personable and had such a pleasant disposition; we knew she would be a great addition to our lives. Chloe has turned out to be the "perfect dog" if there is one, blending right into our lifestyle. This garners them much respect by the community and other organizations in the area.

AFH also demonstrates its commitment to the animals by taking them back if the adoptive parents cannot take care of the animal or no longer want them. They welcome the animals back and will keep them until another qualified home is found. If an animal is returned to a shelter or rescue, they are tagged, linking them to AFH, and the rescue will go pick them up. That tell us that AFH is truly an animal rescue organization that cares about the animals they adopt out.
